Art, Architecture and Design

Johnson Chang

Gallerist and curator Johnson Chang founded Hanart TZ Gallery in Hong Kong introducing contemporary Chinese art to international exhibitions and bringing emerging artists into the limelight. In 2010 his project 'West Heavens' featured collaborations between Chinese and Indian artists and he was named in *Art Review's* Power 100.

Adrian Cheng

Scion of the world's largest jewellery retailer and one of Asia's leading property developers, art incubator and collector Adrian Cheng founded the K11 Art Foundation in 2010 to provide emerging artists with a local and international platform and to promote public art education.

Pearl Lam

'Asia's Art Empress', gallery owner Pearl Lam has been championing artists and designers who challenge perceptions of Asian culture for over 20 years. Lam started organising pop-up exhibitions in Hong Kong in 1993 and now has galleries in Hong Kong, Singapore and Shanghai.

Lee Kit

Internationally-acclaimed Lee Kit is best known for the hand-painted cloths he has been producing for more than a decade. In 2012 he had his first US solo museum exhibition and his installation 'You (you)' received critical acclaim at the 55th Venice Biennale in 2013.

Warren Leung Chi-wo

Multi-disciplinary artist and Para Site Art Space co-founder Leung Chi-wo works with photography, video and text through performance and installation. He has exhibited at the Venice Biennale and his 'No Soul For Sale' exhibition appeared at London's Tate Modern in 2010. His collaborations include ongoing creative work with partner Sara Wong.

Lars Nittve

As executive director of art museum M+, Lars Nittve has overseen the growth of its collection to over 4,000 works during his five-year tenure, and it will be the first major international museum to focus on local art. Swedish Nittve was previously a founding director of London's Tate Modern.

Henry Steiner

Founder of brand consultancy firm Steiner & Co, Austrian-born Henry Steiner pioneered the expression of identity through branding. He is responsible for brands including IBM, Hyatt Regency, Hilton Hotels, HSBC, Standard Chartered and Unilever, and was even commissioned by the Hong Kong government to design the city's bank notes.

Stanley Wong Ping-pui

Ad-man, designer, artist and photographer Stanley Wong, also known as another-mountainman, gained attention with his 'redwhiteblue' series when he represented Hong Kong at the Venice Biennale in 2005. His 'Lanwei' ('broken tail') series shows aborted construction projects following the

economic downturn, and was acquired by M+ museum in 2013.

Rocco S.K. Yim, BBS, JP

Award-winning architect Rocco S.K. Yim co-founded Rocco Design Partners in 1982 and is responsible for many iconic buildings in Hong Kong including iSquare, Victoria Towers and the Guangdong Museum. In 2007 the firm was awarded the hotly-contested tender to design the new Government Headquarters and Legislative Council Complex.

Douglas Young

Designer and trendsetter Douglas Young has broken taboos and crossed boundaries since launching his store G.O.D. (Goods of Desire) with business partner and fellow trained architect Benjamin Lau in 1996. The label's popularity was only boosted by a police raid in 2007, and its designs are sold worldwide.



Henry Steiner

The Arts – Film, Literature and Music

Jackie Chan, SBS, MBE

World-famous Jackie Chan first brought humour to martial arts movies and has appeared in over 150 films, continuing to make blockbusters as a producer and director. Known for his comic timing and innovative stunts, Chan was born into poverty and honed his craft at a harsh Peking opera school.

Raman Hui, BBS

Hong Kong-born animator and film director Raman Hui is the man behind *Monster Hunt*, the cross-genre animation and live action movie that became a blockbuster hit and the highest grossing Chinese film ever. Until then he was best known for co-directing *Shrek the Third* and several short films.

Agnes Lam

Poet Agnes Lam is one of the most authentic Hong Kong voices writing in English and has published three collections of her own as well as studies on Asian poetry in English. A native of Hong Kong, she studied in Singapore and the US.

Andy Lau, MH, JP

Cantopop singer-songwriter, actor, presenter and film producer Andy Lau has been one of Hong Kong's most commercially successful actors since the mid-1980s, performing in more than 160 films while maintaining a successful singing career. He also supports and mentors lesser-known actors and directors.

Trey Lee Chui-ye

Trey Lee was born into a musical family but majored in economics and almost gave up music to be a management consultant. The Hong Kong cellist went on to win major prizes in competitions throughout the world and, as co-founder of the Musicus Society, is an active champion for Chinese music and culture.

Louis Cha Leung-yung, GBM, OBE (Jin Yong)

Better known by his pen name Jin Yong, Louis Cha Leung-yung is the bestselling Chinese-language novelist alive. His wuxia (martial arts and chivalry) works have a following amongst Chinese language readers worldwide and have sold over 100 million copies and been adapted into films, television series, comics and video games.

Nury Vittachi

Fleeing his native Sri Lanka as a small child when his journalist father was targeted during the Civil War, Nury Vittachi is Hong Kong's best-selling English language author, having written more than 25 books, and his comedy-crime series *The Feng Shui Detective* has won him fans both young and old.

Wong Kar-wai, BBS

Hong Kong's Second Wave film director Wong Kar-wai is known for stylised and emotionally resonant films including *Days of Being Wild*, *Chungking Express*, *Fallen Angel* and *The Grandmaster*. He was the first Chinese director to win the Best Director Award at Cannes Film Festival for *Happy Together*.

Novelist Xu Xi established the first low-residency Master of Fine Arts in Asian Writing in English at the City University of Hong Kong, the closure of which drew criticism from the writing community. Her novel *Habit of a Foreign Sky* was shortlisted for the inaugural Man Asian Literary Prize.

Yip Wing-sie, BBS, JP

Hong Kong icon of classical music Yip Wing-sie is the music director of the Hong Kong Sinfonietta and its principal conductor. She has taken the orchestra on numerous overseas tours and is the first Hong Kong conductor to be appointed *Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres* by France.

Business and Industry, Engineering and Entrepreneurs

Cheng Yu-tung, GBM

At 90, billionaire Cheng Yu-tung controls the publicly listed New World Group which has extensive business and real estate interests in Hong Kong and Macau. His Chow Tai Fook Enterprises, the jewellery conglomerate from which his wealth originated, began before World War II with a single store in Macau.

Victor Fung, GBM, GBS and William Fung BSE, OBE, JP

Brothers Victor and William Fung have led the world's largest export trading company Li & Fung through a series of transformations, from the traditional Chinese family conglomerate their grandfather founded in 1906, to a group of innovative public companies of which Victor is Honorary Chairman and William Chairman.

Merle Hinrich

Executive chairman of Global Sources Ltd Merle Hinrich founded his company in 1970. Small companies selling gadgets and clothing in Asia learned to advertise in his sourcing magazines and accept orders

from around the world as Asia's economies grew and the global marketplace was born.

Sir Michael Kadoorie, GBS

Sir Michael, the third generation son of an Iraqi family, oversees groups with assets as varied as Peninsula Hotels, CLP (China Light and Power) Holdings, and the Peak Tramway. He also controls Metrojet Ltd and Heliservices Ltd, and his CLP Research Institute explores developments in renewable energy.

Robert Kuok

Malaysian-born billionaire Robert Kuok started out as an office boy and now holds interests in sugar refineries, sugar cane plantations, oil, mining, finance, property, freight, and publishing across Asia. He opened the Shangri-La hotel group in the 1970s and owns a large stake in Hong Kong's *South China Morning Post*.

Lee Shau-kee, GBM

Lee Shau-kee is chairman of Henderson Land Development, the HK\$189 billion real estate empire he founded nearly 40 years ago. The 87-year-old is the majority owner of a conglomerate with interests in properties, hotels, restaurants and internet services and one of Hong Kong's richest landlords.

A MESSAGE FROM JOANNE MILNER CHIEF EXECUTIVE, DEBRETT'S

When John Debrett founded Debrett's in London in 1769 with the first edition of the *Peerage*, it was the original social network – a handbook the aristocracy referred to for who to do business with, who to invite to parties, and who should marry their daughter! The Debrett's Hong Kong 100, published in association with the *South China Morning Post*, recognises Hong Kong's most influential people. It acknowledges hard work, brilliance, persistence, courage and, occasionally, luck – in short, achievement.

The list has been compiled by Debrett's in consultation with experts in each category, including *South China Morning Post* journalists. All those listed were scrutinised for their influence, which could mean 'hard' power – controlling budgets and policies – or the 'soft' power of the sporting heroes, communicators, artists, entrepreneurs, inventors and visionaries who have had just as much impact on our lives.

A place on the list isn't determined by wealth; it recognises those shaping Hong Kong life and contributing to global debates. We congratulate them all.

In years gone by, Debrett's has been seen as synonymous with the British peerage and privilege. The future lies in global influence, built upon hard work, respect and authority, and it is open to all – we like to refer to it as doing it 'the Debrett's Way'.

Sir Ka-shing Li, GBM, KBE, JP

87-year-old Sir Ka-shing is Asia's most influential entrepreneur with a net worth of over US\$25 billion. As chairman of Hutchison Whampoa Limited (HVL) and Cheung Kong Holdings, his companies include the world's largest operator of container terminals and the world's largest health and beauty retail chains.

Jack Ma

China's richest man in 2014, Jack Ma and his wife Zhang Ying were teachers in China before quitting to become entrepreneurs. They failed at several ventures before raising enough money to create online business-to-business sourcing platform Alibaba. 15 years later, Alibaba's \$25 billion IPO became the largest in US history.

Wang Wei

44-year-old billionaire Wang Wei founded delivery company S.F. Express in 1993 with a US\$13,000 loan from his father. From six deliverymen and a van, S.F. Express grew its cross-border services and now, as 'the

Fedex of China', it boasts 290,000 employees.

Peter Woo Kwong-ching, GBM, GBS, JP

Peter Woo married the philanthropist daughter of shipping tycoon Y. K. Pao and joined her family's business in 1975. At first charged with maintaining the family's wealth, he later oversaw Wheelock's greatest growth period. He left for a decade of public service before returning as chairman in 2002.

Barney Cheng

Award-winning couturier Barney Cheng is best known for his luxury wedding gowns, cocktail dresses and eveningwear, and now also sources and designs gem and diamond sets to complement his clients' bespoke wardrobes. In 2010 he was named in *Forbes China's* Top 25 Most Influential Chinese in Global Fashion.

Stephen Hung

Style icon and Versace fan Stephen Hung is the billionaire behind ultra-luxurious casino resort Louis XIII in Macau. He is a regular on the fashion and social scenes in his eye-catching *haute couture* suits, and he and his Mexican wife Deborah, of model agency Dreammodels, host glamorous costume balls.

Andrew Keith

As president of the Lane Crawford Joyce Group, Andrew Keith is responsible for taking the over-160-year-old luxury retailer into the 21st century. In his first week of office, Scottish-born Keith announced three additional stores to be opened in mainland China in addition to its existing Beijing store.

Lo Kai-yin, SBS

Lo Kai-yin is a designer, event organiser, curator, cultural historian and editor of five books. Melding the cultural heritages of East and West, she presents art and design in a historical context and in 2007 was named the World's Leading Chinese Designer by the Hong Kong Design Centre.

Fiona Kotur-Marin

Handbag designer Fiona Kotur-Marin brought back the *minaudière* – a small, decorative clutch – at a time when the market was saturated with oversized bags, garnering international attention for her eponymous brand. Her playful, witty and sophisticated designs have won a loyal client base.

Joyce Ma

After a stint in the family retail business, Joyce Ma founded the Joyce Boutique in 1970, becoming an ambassador for Hong Kong fashion. She is credited with introducing western designers, including major brands like Gucci, Armani and Prada, to Hong Kong and Asia.

Yana Peel

Yana Peel, CEO of the Intelligence Squared Group, is recognised in Hong Kong as an elegant fashion icon and imported her passion for art and fashion to Hong Kong five years ago when she brought live debates and performance art to Art Basel in Hong Kong.

Kim Robinson

Having coiffed the hair of Princess Diana, Kate Moss and Zhang Ziyi, celebrity hairstylist Kim Robinson is a celebrity herself. Expert at styling clients' hair to suit their face shape, his US\$1600 haircuts combine state-of-the-art technology with an artist's eye and touch.

Sarah Rutson

Spotter of both trends and new design talent, Sarah Rutson is the fashion director responsible for the rebranding of highly influential Hong Kong-based luxury department store Lane Crawford. She is now the vice-president of global buying for online couture discounter Net-a-Porter.

Vivienne Tam

Vivienne Tam's designs are inspired by Chinese culture and East-West fusion. After designing her first label, East Wind Code, she launched her eponymous line in New York in 1994. Her controversial Mao collection is now housed in the Andy Warhol Museum in Pittsburgh and the Metropolitan Museum in New York.





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Food and Drink

Jeannie Cho Lee
Korean-born Jeannie Cho Lee is the first Asian Master of Wine whose first book *Asian Palate* explores wine and Asian food pairings, winning a Gourmand Award in 2010. Lee holds a Certificat de Cuisine from Cordon Bleu and trained as a Sake Sommelier at Japan's Sake Service Institute.

Bonnae Gokson
Hong Kong's cake queen and owner of Ms B's Cakery and the Cest La B café bars, Bonnae Gokson previously worked in fashion and hospitality before founding celebrity hotspot Sewa in Central. Style icon Gokson became an award-winning author in 2014 with her book *Butterflies and All Things Sweet*.

Mak Kwai-pui
Dumpling master Mak Kwai-pui runs the world's cheapest Michelin-starred restaurant Tim Ho Wan, a hole-in-the-wall in Mongkok serving dim sum. Formerly at the Four Seasons' three Michelin star restaurant Lung King Heen, he has opened five more outlets from Central to Sham Shui Po and has expanded overseas.

Susan Jung
Cookbook author and SCMP's senior food and wine editor for the last 18 years, Susan Jung was born in California. Her 2012 book *A Celebration of Food* contains 80 Western, Chinese and other Asian recipes, including many from her own column and others by top Hong Kong chefs.

Alvin Leung
With blue-tinted hair and tattoos, MasterChef Canada's 'Demon Chef' Alvin Leung is a three Michelin star chef who taught himself to cook and isn't afraid to experiment: his most famous dish is 'Sex on the Beach' featuring an 'edible condom' made out of mushrooms and filled with honey and ham.

Yeung Koon-yat, BBS, MH
If a mollusc can determine a man's destiny, Yeung Koon-yat found his in the precious abalone (edible sea snail), cooking his way to Michelin stardom at his over 40 Forum restaurants. The 'King of Abalone' grew up in poverty in Guangdong where two of his sisters died of starvation.

Simon Tam
Christie's head of wine for China and founder of the Independent Wine Centre in Hong Kong and Shanghai, Simon Tam is a

Entrepreneur Allan Zeman, the 'Father of Lan Kwai Fong', built Hong Kong's premier entertainment rendezvous and advised on the facelift of Ocean Park. Born in Germany and raised in Montreal, he started working aged ten and by 19 had earned his first million by importing clothes from Hong Kong.

Sport

Tony Cruz
Born and raised in Hong Kong, and of Portuguese descent, Tony Cruz is a legend of Hong Kong horse racing, winning more races than any other jockey. As a trainer, he famously trained Hong Kong champion Silent Witness to win 17 consecutive races.

Winfried Engelbrecht-Bresges, JP
As CEO of the Hong Kong Jockey Club since February 2007, German-born Winfried Engelbrecht-Bresges has driven the development of racing in Hong Kong and expanded its appeal to a younger crowd. His other roles include vice-chairman of the International Federation of Horseracing Authorities, the world's highest racing authority.

Timothy Fok Tsun-ting, GBS, JP
Timothy Fok is the champion of sports in Hong Kong, representing athletes and sports associations in Legco (the Hong Kong legislative council). He is the most important player when it comes to sports legislation, funding and putting Hong Kong on the Olympic map.

Siobhan Haughey
At 17, Siobhan Haughey is Hong Kong's first swimmer to qualify for the Olympics by clocking two minutes, 13.07 seconds in the 200m individual medley at the World Championships in Kazan, Russia. Ranked in the top 15 in the world, she earned direct entry to next year's Rio Olympics.

Simon Ip Sik-on
As chairman of the Hong Kong Jockey Club's Board of Stewards, former law firm

senior partner Simon Ip Sik-on has seen the club's Charities Trust donate an average of HK\$1 billion per year for the last ten years to charitable causes, including sporting recipients.

Sarah Lee Wai-sze, MH
Hong Kong's most eminent international athlete, sprint cyclist Sarah Lee won Hong Kong's first-ever Olympic medal in cycling with a bronze at the London Olympics in 2012. She went on to win a gold medal in Belarus in 2013 and is a medal hope for Rio next year.

generation of athletes who have won numerous titles and medals. Born in Shanghai, Shen joined the national cycling team, but a terrible cycling accident cost him his lower leg. He retrained to become a coach, his unique style winning him many prestigious awards.

Lee Lai-shan, MBE, BBS
Former world champion and Olympic gold medal-winning windsurfer Lee Lai-Shan has inspired many young athletes. She was one of the first sports stars to put Hong Kong on the global map as the only athlete to win an Olympic medal for Hong Kong before the Handover, in Atlanta in 1996.

Thomas Brian Stevenson, SBS, JP
As president of the Hong Kong Rugby Union since 2001, Scotsman Thomas Brian Stevenson has played a huge role in sports in Hong Kong over 20 years and continues to wield influence as vice-president of the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong.

Shen Jinkang, BBS, MH
Cycling coach Shen Jinkang has mentored a

Stage and Screen

Chan Shuk-leung, GBS (also known as Pak Suet-sin)
Daughter of Cantonese opera legend Pak Kui Wing Chan Shuk-leung insisted on formal training and took on small roles at first. In 1956 she formed Sin Fung Ming Opera Troupe with Yam Kim Fai and is recognised for helping to transform Cantonese opera from populist entertainment to an aesthetic form.

Donald Chow Yun-fat, SBS
Prolific and versatile, actor Chow Yun-fat is best known in Asia for his collaborations with filmmaker John Woo in heroic bloodshed films *A Better Tomorrow*, *The Killer* and *Hard Boiled*, and in the West for his roles in *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon* and *Pirates of the Caribbean: At World's End*.

Stephen Chow
Chow produced, directed, wrote and acted in *Shaolin Soccer*, the highest grossing film in the history of Hong Kong cinema, and was producer, director, screenwriter, actor and composer of *Kung Fu Hustle*. For his role in *Final Justice* he won the Best Supporting Actor award at the Taiwanese Film Awards.

Tsui Hark
Vietnamese-born Tsui Hark is an influential and acclaimed New Wave director, producer and screenwriter, who moved to Hong Kong at 14. He co-founded his production house Film Workshop with his former-wife, producer

Bill Kong Chi-keung
Kong runs Edko Films and Broadway Circuit, the largest cinema chain in Hong Kong. The producer of *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon*, Kong is an Academy Award nominee and a BAFTA and Independent Spirit Awards winner. He produced *Lust, Caution*, and *Monster Hunt*, and other acclaimed films, including *Zhang Zhi-mou's Hero*.

Helen Lai
Helen Lai is one of East Asia's foremost dance-makers as resident choreographer for the City Contemporary Dance Company (CCDC), of which she was a founding member and artistic director. Her work for Cloud Gate Dance Theatre, Guangdong Modern Dance Company and Singapore Dance Theatre has earned numerous awards.

Albert Lee
CEO of Emperor Motion Pictures Albert Lee oversees great box-office success. He spent two years in Taiwan developing the online business for music company Rock Records and represents Emperor in Hong Kong's Chamber of Films and the Hong Kong Motion Picture Industry Association.

Fredric Mao Chun-fai, BBS
Mao is celebrated for merging traditional Chinese opera with contemporary theatre. He has served as artistic director of the Napa Valley Theatre Company in California, head of acting at the Hong Kong Academy

for Performing Arts, and artistic director of the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre which appointed him Director Laureate.

Tang Shu-wing
'Alchemist of minimalist theatre' Tang Shu-wing is one of Hong Kong's foremost stage directors, named Best Director three times at the Hong Kong Drama Awards. He is currently artistic director of Tang Shu-wing Theatre Studio and head of the first physical theatre training programme in Hong Kong.

John Woo, SBS
Woo is a Hong Kong film director, writer and producer whose *Hard Target* made him the first Asian director to make a mainstream Hollywood film. Woo has directed notable Hong Kong films *A Better Tomorrow* and *Red Cliff*. His Hollywood films include *Broken Arrow*, *Face/Off* and *Mission: Impossible II*.



Chan Shuk-leung, GBS

Science and Medicine

Dr Margaret Chan, OBE, JP
Hong Kong-born Dr Chan joined the Department of Health in 1978 and has been director-general of the World Health Organisation since 2006. Having dealt with the threat of avian influenza and SARS, she is one of the world's most visionary and experienced public health crisis managers.

Ronnie Chan and Gerald Chan
Brothers Ronnie and Gerald Chan donated \$350 million to the Harvard School of Public Health, its largest single donation, with the aim of improving health throughout the world. They co-founded the Morningside Fund, which invests in biotech companies and sponsors scholarships and research at universities in China and abroad.

Dr Nancy Ip Yuk-yu, JP
Award-winning Dr Ip is dean of science, Morningside Professor of Life Science and director of the State Key Laboratory of Molecular Neuroscience at Hong Kong University of Science and Technology. Working in the fields of biotechnology, protein biology and brain development, she has published numerous papers and holds 23 patents.

Professor Gabriel Matthew Leung, GBS
Dean of the Li Ka Shing Faculty of Medicine at the University of Hong Kong, Leung directed the university's Infectious Disease Epidemiology Group during the 2003 SARS epidemic and led actions to combat the H1N1 outbreak. Hong Kong's first under-secretary for food and health, he has received many prestigious awards.

Professor Alexander Ng
Ng is deputy director of the China Health Programme for the Gates Foundation. For nine years he was co-leader of McKinsey & Company's Greater China Healthcare and Corporate Finance practices in Hong Kong and is an adviser to the Hong Kong Council on Smoking Cessation.

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Steven Lam
